Rexford Trolley Stop

The electric trolley stop can be seen in the left foreground. Trolley lines all over the United States brought city folk to amusement parks. Residents of Schenectady could take the trolley to the amusement park in Rexford from 1906 when the park opened along the Mohawk River, until it went out of business in 1935. The roller coaster and carousel can clearly be seen in the photograph.

Other rides included a swing ride that swung out over the Mohawk River, a train ride, and chute the cutes where

you came down a giant slide in a small boat into a pool of water. There was a fun house, theatre that featured vaudeville acts and an outside stage where daredevils and gymnasts would perform. It was a busy place during the early twentieth century. The carousel at the park supposedly ended up at Kaydeross Park on Saratoga Lake and is now in Congress Park in Saratoga Springs.

Originally from Port Jefferson, Long Island, Nancy Katinas enjoyed playing sports and loved living close to the beach. A lover of learning, she initially went to school for marketing, but her college had a huge education program. Since she had always liked school and children, she was naturally drawn to that program instead. Not thinking that her childhood hobbies might turn into a career, Nancy graduated from Suny Brockport and Suny Albany with her degree and masters in Education. She also happens to have a Bachelor's degree in Earth Science. (Did she mention she enjoyed school?) After graduation, she first worked as a substitute teacher for the Shen schools before teaching in both the Glens Falls City Schools and Ballston Spa City Schools.

She met her husband, George, back when they were kids on Long Island. Growing up in the same hometown, they started dating late in high school. They went off to different colleges, but kept circling back to each other every summer, and eventually married, settling down in Clifton Park. After having her second child, Nancy decided to stay home with their children. She had started indoor cycling for fun in 1999 and immediately became hooked. She received her certification in Spin® originally to work at the gym for a free membership. She later followed up her certification with Fitour, Core Ball, Body Pump and Body Step.

After her third child was born, Nancy began teaching fitness classes at the gym. Her Spin® class was becoming so popular that there were people repeatedly blocked out of it due to space. It was difficult to get spots at all the gyms in the area. Some of these people suggested to her that she open her own place. After some thought, they opened a studio together as partners seven years ago in Clifton Park. "The Revolution," a state-of-the-art indoor cycling and fitness studio, was born.

Focusing on indoor cycling (which is a little different than Spin®), they made their studio more unique by

adding fusion classes, which include light weights and core work with the cycling. It was something different for the area and became popular immediately. "It is a great combination of cardio and strength," says Nancy. "A total body workout in 45-60 minutes, burning lots of calories!" Two years later, they opened a studio in Loudonville and this fall will be opening their Albany location as well.

Nancy and George are now the sole owners and use state-of-the-art-equipment, rockin' music and numbers to push participants toward their fitness goals. Using Performance IQ software (as seen on *The Biggest Loser* and other fitness shows), riders can see current heart rate, work zones and calories burned during their ride on a flat screen right in class. The results are also emailed to each participant after the workout to track performance and progress. Nancy has found that this rapidly increases motivation and allows for team competition while tracking performance history.

Using high-energy music formats to help push class members, combined with elite instructors with backgrounds in varied fitness areas, members receive not only a fun ride, but an incredible, heart-pumping workout – easily burning 600-1,000 calories in a single class. It's also a "go at our own pace" format. Nancy's creation of this unique cycling atmosphere has built a combination of camaraderie, high intensity, and of course, fun! It's a different atmosphere than she expected to be teaching in while in college, but she still loves teaching. "I enjoy staying in shape and the social aspect. It is fun to workout with people from all different lines of work – when you turn lights down and get on the bike – everyone's on the same page!" she says.

Nancy, George and their three children, Ava (18), Ryan (16) and Adrian (13), are active within the community outside of the studio as well. The kids are into lacrosse, diving and football. Ava is on her school's student council and student athletic advisory council while working part time as well. She is heading to the University at Albany next year on a lacrosse scholarship and plans to study Human Biology, working toward the Physician Assistant program. Ryan works at Market 32, and following in his mom's entrepreneur footsteps, has also started his own small landscaping business, already with 10 clients and growing.

Outside of working out, Nancy enjoys reading and spending time with family and friends. They love to go out to dinner in the area and often frequent Proctors and SPAC to take in the shows, as well as attend the Shen sporting

events including lacrosse, soccer, swim & dive, and football. They have run in several 5Ks and 15Ks and a half marathon in the area, as well as participated in the Anyone Can TRI at the Saratoga YMCA.


Nancy's "Fitness for Life" motto carries over into other areas of life as well. "It embraces not only encouraging personal wellness for women, but also using 'fitness' to support the 'life' of others who desperately need greater awareness and funds to advance their charity missions," she says. She has helped raise this awareness for a variety of causes by hosting fitness fundraisers at the studios and has participated in many marathons and galas as well. Some of these causes include breast cancer awareness, leukemia & lymphoma research, diabetes, autism, antismoking, Hannah's Hope, ovarian cancer research and more.

She hopes that her studios can show everyone that not only can working out be fun, but that fitness is something that can be for life. It's never too late to start or to try something new. Be realistic with yourself in order to lay a strong foundation in your fitness and wellness goals. "The most important thing is finding a workout that you love!" she says. "The more fun you have with the instructor, the music, the club and other members, the easier it is to be consistent in showing up. When you are consistent in showing up, that's when you see results. Try to find a friend to work out with. Commit to 2-3 times a week (anything more than that is great!) but be realistic – if you have a job, family, kids, you probably can't go seven days a week, so don't set yourself up to fail. Every day is a new start!"

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Solarize Albany and Capital Region

The Clifton Park GREEN Committee (Government Re-Thinking Energy & Environment Now) guided by Councilwoman Amy Standaert, is involved in many annual events such as shredding day, Shen Science Night, tree give away and Habitat For Humanity partnership to reuse unwanted good condition furniture and building materials. One of the long term and behind-the-scene projects that many might not know about is the Town's participation in NYSERDA's Clean Energy Communities, which recognizes and rewards local governments for implementing clean energy. In this program there are 10 high impact actions and the Town needs to complete 4 of them, which are:

- Benchmarking Adopt a policy to report the energy use of public buildings
- Unified Solar Permit Streamline the approvals process for solar
- Energy Code Enforcement Training - Train compliance officers in energy code best practices
- Solarize Undertake a local solarize campaign to increase the number of solar installations.


When the four tasks are completed, Clifton Park will be eligible for a \$150,000 grant to support additional clean energy projects with no local cost share.

We are fortunate that the successful Solarize Albany program has expanded to eight more counties, giving us the opportunity to participate and accomplish our fourth task (so we are close to this award!). The Solarize Albany and Capital Region is a grassroots, citizen-run volunteer organization made up of people who care about educating the public about generating their own

clean energy from the sun.

The Solarize program is like a Consumers Report of solar. Solarize has interviewed and evaluated solar companies in a competitive process to participate in Solarize based on quality of product, service, installation and price. This year, instead of picking one installer to run the program, Solarize has picked the top three for consumers to choose from. If you cannot put panels on your roof due to poor orientation or shading issues, there is a community solar option. Now is a great time to take charge of your utility costs and go solar since National Grid has applied for a rate increase.

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No Horned Helmets at Opera Saratoga

For some, opera evokes images of Vikings in horned helmets singing loudly in German. Evoke that stereotype for Lawrence Edelson and he's likely to roll his eyes before he begins laughing. "Yes, people often joke about opera in such terms," Edelson says, "but clearly they haven't been to a performance at Opera Saratoga!"

Edelson has been the Artistic and General Director at Opera Saratoga since July of 2014, and over the past legendary Jim Henson, directs this magical production that is ideal for the whole family. The final production is Blitzstein's *The Cradle Will Rock*. An allegory on corruption and corporate greed both timely and timeless, *The Cradle Will Rock's* biting humor and brazenness is as impactful now as it was when it premiered on Broadway in 1937. *The Cradle Will Rock* was actually shut down on its opening night by the government in an act of censorship, because the pro-union

plot was feared to be too radical. Opera Saratoga will celebrate the 80th Anniversary of that infamous night with a new production, directed by Edelson, and conducted by acclaimed Maestro John Mauceri, who will lead

three years, he has been showing our community that old-fashioned stereotypes about opera don't really hold water anymore. "My goal," says Edelson, "is to share with audiences the breadth and depth of what opera can be."

Opera Saratoga's 2017 Summer Festival opens with Verdi's comic masterpiece, *Falstaff*, which was last performed in the region over 25 years ago. Next up is Grétry's *Zémire et Azor (Beauty and the Beast)*. One of the first musical adaptations of the classic fairytale, this opera-ballet was one of Mozart's favorite works. James Ortiz, whose innovative use of puppetry has been compared to the

Blitzstein's original orchestration for the first time anywhere in the world in over 50 years.

Misconceptions Of A Dry Basement

Wet basements are a pain. They are frustrating, can be costly and most don't know that there is a way to effectively eliminate the issue. There are several popular products on the market that homeowners try, only to find they only worked for a brief amount of time or not at all. Let's look at some of

the good and not-so-good methods for fixing a wet basement.

The best place to start is outside, but it may not end there. The first thing to do is make sure gutter outlets are directed away from your foundation. During rains, you are funneling water off of your roof only to have it dump right near the foundation.

With all that water right near your foundation, you are bound to have a problem! The gutter downspouts should be extended 6-10 feet away from the home to prevent water from infiltrating the basement. Also check to see if the soil near the foundation has settled, and is it now pitching back toward the house? If it is, add more soil to provide a positive pitch away from the foundation. Be careful not to be too close to the top of the foundation as it can create rotting and insect issues. Eight to ten inches is a good rule of thumb.

By directing water away, you should have lessened the amount coming inside, but many people find they still have a wet basement! The next step would be to have a water collection and drainage system installed. Trying to seal a foundation from water infiltration typically is a futile effort – concrete cracks and moves and sealants lose their bond to the concrete and fail. I prefer to see a more permanent solution. The typical method is outside excavation. The problem with this is the pipe in the dirt outside the home


clogs over time. Bad idea! The preferred method is a system installed below the floor inside the home that is serviceable with a pumping system that includes a backup pump powered by a battery system or a backup generator. This should solve your issues.

Did you spend most of your life thinking that the best salad dressings came out of a bottle, like I did? It was not until I was in my mid-twenties that I had a really delectable dressing, asked what brand it was and got a blank stare from my hostess. The friend hosting dinner simply said, "It's oil and vinegar." I replied, "What brand?" She proceeded to explain that it was just extra virgin olive oil and balsamic vinegar, right out of their own bottles... with a little salt and pepper. I was shocked. When I got home, I tossed all the bottled dressings we had. From then on, I used her simple trick: olive oil, balsamic, salt and pepper. In the last ten years, it's amazing how many times I have been asked the same question when having friends over for dinner at my own home. It's also amazing the look, the same one I probably gave my friend all those year back, that people give me when they realize how simple it is.

When I started to think about it, I realized how many restaurants throughout my life always had cruets of oil and vinegar on the table. Without even thinking about them, however, I would quickly order ranch or some premixed vinaigrette that I just assumed would be better. I regret missing out for so long!

Here's hoping my epiphany may inspire you to try your own dressing the next time you serve a salad. We begin every dinner with a salad, even if it is just spinach with our simple dressing. In time, you will find the perfect ratio for your taste buds; and likely, you will find your perfect pour, not even bothering to measure after a while. You might be surprised how far the dressing can stretch when tossed well into the salad.

Best place to start:

3 tablespoons of extra virgin olive oil

2 tablespoons of balsamic vinegar

Salt and pepper to taste

Modifications:

You can give your dressing an Italian flare by sprinkling the salad with Italian seasoning before you toss it.

In the warmer months, switch to red or white wine vinegar for something lighter.

For a tasty twist, replace the vinegar with an equal amount of lemon juice.

For a kick, add honey and mustard to taste.

For a creamier dressing, add a few tablespoons of plain yogurt to the oil and vinegar mixture before adding it to the salad.

Artists working in all mediums are encouraged to exhibit up to three pieces of artwork in this fabulous exhibition! The 10x10 Exhibition celebrates the community and




