The Birth Of Earthly Solar Power When was solar electric power invented?

Short answer? Modern solar PV was invented in 1954. But wait – there's more to the story!

These days, we take solar electric (photo voltaic, or PV) power for granted. It's on our space ships, our homes, our calculators, and numerous everyday electrical gadgets. So, who thought this up, and how did we get to where we are?

Look out at your sunny lawn or driveway. Each square meter of it is receiving 1,000 watts of potential solar power; that's enough for 10 old incandescent 100 watt lightbulbs (or a whole bunch of LED ones!), or a medium-sized toaster or microwave oven. Converting it to electricity though, Ah! That's the trick. And the winning solution? Highly refined sand, also known as silicon.

Back in 1839, Frenchman Edward Becquerel was the first to recognize the photovoltaic effect – a tiny voltage in a wire immersed in a conductive solution exposed to light.

In 1883, American Charlie Fitz used selenium on a thin layer of gold. This was 1% efficient.



During the 115 years since Becquerel's discovery, 23 other major inventors and milestones led to crystalline silicon and other enhancements.

The breakthrough came in 1954 when Darryl Chapin and other scientists at Bell Labs tried using silicon and added tiny amounts of boron and phosphorus. The result was impressive: 6% efficiency! Oh, you say; not impressed? Well, consider that a tomato plant is only 1% efficient at converting sunlight to plant energy. Besides, we're talking about highly refined sand, remember?

This was enough to build small solar panels that would provide telephone service to remote areas, and soon led to panels on spacecraft. (Spacecraft, by the way, use toxic materials not permissible on Earth but are about half again as powerful as modern home solar panels.) As commercialization expanded, research produced everstronger panels.

Today, the average home solar panels are 15-18% efficient. The very best ones are over 22% efficient (and cells are even more). That's enough to make excellent economic sense for anyone who wants solar now. Will they become better yet? Somewhat, but not much; there are some limits to growth. The good news is that a reputable solar brand will still be making good power 25 years from now, and in the best brand, up to 40 years. All with no moving parts, no bad side effects, with complete quiet, and without polluting our atmosphere. Pretty cool, huh? And all from sand....

Her teacher and parents both say that they have seen her grow during the past year and that she has become much more comfortable speaking up for herself, as well as for fellow classmates.

"Jocelyn has really begun to advocate for herself and others. She recently spoke in a class meeting in a very responsible and mature way. She has also found her voice quite literally as she is learning to play guitar and sing," said

Teresa Burke, Brown School's director of middle and high school.

Jocelyn agrees that she is feeling more at ease with herself since coming to Brown, thanks to the supportive environment at school combined with a number of adults who have acted as mentors for her. She's still working on immediately standing up for herself if the situation calls for it.

Outside of school, Jocelyn delves into her artistic side, and is able to see the beauty in many things. "I love photography, illustration and reading the most." According to her mother Cindy Bishop, Jocelyn spends a lot of time cultivating the "perfect shot."

Her mother adds that Jocelyn is also a voracious reader and absorbs everything she reads, which makes her a great conversationalist; she is very articulate and has a vocabulary that is years beyond her chronological age.

One special talent that

Jocelyn's schoolmates may not be aware of is that at

Using Film & Humor to Make a Difference

Film can be a medium for so many things. It can make us laugh and forget about the real world for a while, but it can also force us to face the uncomfortable; to feel emotions maybe we're not quite prepared for. It serves as a source of therapy. It can teach us about things we've never thought of before and help us to learn something new and to experience our world from our very own couches. It inspires us to make changes in our own lives or to do good in the world. It allows us to understand humanity and to comprehend ourselves.

Bobby Chase is a local filmmaker that has been using this medium to entertain and inspire for years, and now he's also using it to support a cause that is very near to his heart.


Originally from Mechanicville, Bobby enjoyed playing football, basketball, Nintendo and watching movies with friends. He would spend time with his family while everyone told jokes and stories to one another. He was fascinated with comedy and would often watch the great standup comedians of the time with his father and brother, even from a young age. "I liked to hear them laugh even though I didn't get some of the jokes at the time," he says. Those experiences always stayed with him. "I love to laugh and I love to create, so I think I am in the right business," he adds.

But it took him a little time to figure out exactly what that business was. He went to college at SUNY Plattsburgh originally intending to study audio production through their communications program. He thought he would go into sound design for film/television or that he would be a music producer. He found himself in a television writing class, where he wrote a spec script for the

TV show, Seinfeld, as a project. He had a lot of fun writing it and realized that it came more naturally to him than anything in the math or science field. After completing more production classes, he began creating his own student films. One of his films, The *Last Supper,* which was a spoof on the famous painting using modern day technology and flash animation, culminated with winning the regional National Broadcasting Society award. These national awards are presented through the National Electronic Media Association and are the equivalent of the Emmys for college students.

He felt like he had found his calling and after graduation contacted local filmmakers to see if he could work for them for free to gain experience. He joined forces with director Jeff Knight, assisting with audio and editing work in order to better learn the craft and to network. Bobby worked on a few low-budget films before landing a job as a voice-over producer/video editor at Whitelake Music and Post, a local recording studio. He worked there a few years before moving to New York City to work full time in the freelance film industry. While in the city, he produced two web series and created multiple spec scripts for both film and television, which led to sit-down meetings with Hollywood production companies. While writing for a DVD review company, he also had the opportunity to interview actor,





Will Farrell, on a rooftop in Manhattan about Farrell's latest movie at the time, *Everything Must Go.* "He was really cool," says Bobby. "He was telling stories from when he lived there when he was on SNL and doing his Bush impression. He was really funny. He's a very intelligent man."

Bobby eventually decided to come back home and worked in the advertising department at CBS 6 as a video producer/director while he continued to produce his own work on the side. His web series, Experi-Mates, was selected to screen at the Hollyweb Festival in Hollywood, which resulted in meetings with a few producers at the Universal Studios lot. Nothing went through with that particular one, but he kept creating and one day was talking with some other industry friends: Dan Martin, Justin Alvis and Amanda Stankavich. Together, they came up with the idea of a situation comedy series about three thirtysomethings that end up back home with their parents, and the project took off. Season one of Welcome Home is now available through Amazon Prime and they're currently in the middle of shooting season two. Bobby is really excited about this new season. He said the overall quality is higher thanks not only to better equipment and a real budget to work with, but also to the

series really finding its niche and the writing, acting, everything clicking on a new level this time around.

Working in film definitely has its shortcomings and you have to be prepared for compromise at every level. "There is constant rejection," says Bobby. "And then when working with other people, there are many times in which you have to make compromises in order to keep the project from crumbling." But in the end, it's all worth it. "I love that every day is different. It's never mundane. There's a certain type of therapy when

writing and creating something that helps with peace of mind. I also love that I get to collaborate with other talented people."

In addition to his film work, Bobby is the Creative Director at Go Gonzalez, creating TV commercials and web content for their clients, as well as running his own production company, Next Evolution Media Production, where he focuses on TV and film production as well as producing other media and web videos for clients. His latest project, though, is a very personal one. His short film, Jacob, is based on his own experience as a suicide survivor; depicting the moment he found his brother's body and how he managed to deal with it all. This was a film that has been living inside of him for 10 years since the tragedy happened. He always knew he wanted to touch on the subject, but wasn't sure how.

"I was always big into comedy and movies," he explains. "What inspires me as a filmmaker is the ridiculousness of the world that we live in and its often negative undertones. I had the misfortune of finding my brother's body after he took his life. That's a different kind of funeral. The tone is completely different. No one really knew what to do or how to react and a lot of them

seemed to look to me for some sort of leadership. I somehow managed to incorporate my sense of humor, somewhat changing the atmosphere. Everyone seemed more relaxed and started to speak more freely. It was there I realized I could use my background as a filmmaker and sense of humor in order to make people enjoy life again."

Finally he found the right way to make this deeply personal film and it already won its first award at the People's Pixel Project film festival on April 22nd. "I made it in hopes of being a positive message for others who had gone through a similar thing all while still giving some entertainment value. It's honest, intense and has a great blend of lighthearted moments," says Bobby. He used his own personal experience as the survivor and blended it with his signature lighthearted view of life to create something that is already helping others.

His goal is initially to start a much-needed conversation. "I just want people to talk about the situation. I'm sure there are many people that have gone through this. I've had a couple people reach out already that have attempted suicide before saying that it's helped them." And while it has also helped bring some closure to

Bobby himself, his work with this is far from over. While the film is making the festival circuit, Bobby is also raising money for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. *Jacob* will soon be available on Amazon along with a link to donate to the foundation directly from there as well.

Comedy and film have influenced Bobby's life from the very beginning and he urges anyone interested in the field to persevere and to just go for it. Keep your eyes and heart on your goal and don't give up. "Don't listen to people. Listen to inspiration. Many people are going to tell you what you should be or need to be doing and it's usually not in your best interest. There's only one of you. You have a distinct voice. That alone has a huge price tag on it because it's a rare commodity. Find your voice and run with it."

Welcome to the Neighborhood

Boy Scouts from Troop 6 in Jonesville assist the Chamber of Southern Saratoga County (CSSC) during **Canal Clean Sweep** in Clifton Park, for annual maintenance and cleanup at Historic Lock 19 in Vischer Ferry. 2018 marks 100 years since the original Erie Canal was replaced by the modern New York State Barge Canal (now known as the Canal System), so remnants of the 1842 version of the canal are threatened by their age, the elements and vandals every year. CSSC-led volunteers have kept the Lock maintained in its present state since 2012, investing over \$200,000 in real and in-kind services to stabilize and enhance the structure and provide public access.





The CSSC's Executive ACCESS participants got a behind-the-scenes opportunity to go inside of GLOBALFOUNDRIES in Malta in late April. In contrast to huge foundries of old, this massive facility, hidden in the deep woods of the Luther Forest, leads the world in nanotechnology innovation, manufacturing millions of microchips for modern computerized devices on a tiny scale once thought unimaginable. Have you ever heard anyone say, "I hate movies"? I haven't. Even if you're not a big movie buff, there is likely a movie out there that you really enjoy. Maybe you like comedies over science fiction, or perhaps period dramas excite your imagination – but you probably don't hate movies altogether!

"I hate opera." Now that's a sentence I do hear sometimes, but it makes no more sense than "I hate movies!" There are many different types of opera: raucous comedies, political thrillers, heart-breaking romances... something for everyone. The music of opera is also as diverse as the stories told. Opera comes in many flavors, and it is my goal to present an exciting menu of opera every summer at Opera Saratoga.

Our season opens on June 29th with one of the most famous operettas in the world, *The Merry Widow*. Hanna Glawari, the Merry Widow, is beautiful and rich... Will she be able to find a suitor that is not only after her wealth? Will the nation of Pontevedro slip into economic collapse if she marries a foreigner? Will all those dancing girls prove too distracting for the audience?! If you like Broadway musicals, you will love *The Merry Widow* – a romance and a comedy tied together with sparkling dance numbers and beautiful music that you'll leave the theater humming!

And, speaking of Broadway, did you know that many American operas premiered on Broadway? In 1950, The New York Times hailed the Broadway premiere of *The Consul* as "a smash hit!" Almost 70 years later, Menotti's riveting opera still delivers a punch as powerful and timely as its subject matter - the struggle for freedom against

oppression, and the maddening nature of unrelenting bureaucracy. *The Consul*, which won both the Pulitzer Prize in Music and the New York Drama Critic's Circle Award, is a true political thriller that remains as timely as when it was written.

Our third production is a double-bill of one-act operas that revolve around gambling and competition. If you've

ever seen the hilarious movie Best in Show, you will love Vinkensport, or The Finch Opera. In Vinkensport, we see a motley assortment of contestants battle to see who has – not the best dog as in Best in Show – but the most melodious bird! The second half of the double-bill brings thoroughbred racing to our stage for the first time. In Rocking Horse Winner, a modern adaptation of D.H. Lawrence's short story, Paul becomes dangerously obsessed with solving the "bad luck" of his



family. His pursuit awakens a strange magic that allows him to predict which horses will win at the track!

All of this summer's operas are sung in English and are performed in the intimate Spa Little Theatre in Spa State Park. In addition to these three productions, Opera Saratoga presents a variety of concerts across the region – many of which are free – from May 26th through July 15th. Historic Grooms Tavern

The Town of Clifton Park acquired the Historic Grooms Tavern at the corner of Grooms and Sugar Hill Roads in 1999. James Groom constructed the building in about 1825, shortly after the opening of the Erie Canal the same year. The tavern served both travelers and the local community. The

second floor public room hosted social and political events. In fact, Clifton Park's first Town Board meeting was held there in 1828. The population of the Town of Halfmoon had increased due to the opening of the Erie Canal and it was necessary to create a new town from the western half of Halfmoon. The new town was named Clifton Park after the land patent granted by Queen Anne of England

in 1708.

Grooms Tavern, later a General Store, postcard view, by Parker Goodfellow, c. 1910, site of Clifton Park's first Town Board meeting in 1828.

By the 1870s the tap room of the tavern was converted to a General Store. Three generations of the Groom family owned the tavern and store, until it was purchased in 1921 by Ed Klingbeil who operated the store until his death in 1971. Many older residents of town remember Ed as a rather eccentric character who wore a red toupee.

The Town of Clifton Park with the help of several public grants has restored the tavern and it now serves as the Town's historical and cultural center. The adjacent unrestored blacksmith shop and the 1896 Grange Hall are a part of this historical complex.

The Friends of Historic Grooms Tavern assist the town in caring for these historic buildings and in hosting special events and programs. The Friends is a membership

organization and has been responsible for obtaining grant money and assisting in various restoration projects, most recently the restoration of the tavern's public room where special exhibits on town history are now featured. They also maintain the gardens at the tavern, which are spectacular

when in bloom. A new cookbook has been produced to raise additional funds for tavern maintenance. Acknowledging their hard work, the Town of Clifton Park recently presented the Friends of Historic Grooms Tavern with their annual Preservation Award at the May 7 Town Board Meeting.

The tavern is opened for special events and will also be open on Saturdays in June from 12 noon to 3pm for public visitation. Stop in, have a look and learn about Clifton Park history. The Friends of Grooms Tavern are always looking for new members and volunteers.
