

Heidi Rotter is an inspirational woman, proving again and again what passion, determination, and a will to succeed can do.

A Capital Region girl, Heidi grew up in Rotterdam as part of a close-knit family. A "daddy's girl" from the beginning, Heidi always played outside, tinkering with tools, mowing the lawn, stacking wood, and finding ways to help her father. She came of age in a neighborhood where friends were around every corner. A pile of bikes usually adorned the front lawn as the group of neighborhood kids enjoyed idyllic summer days playing wiffle ball, night hide-and-seek, movie nights, and of course, swimming all summer long. At home, Heidi couldn't wait for her mom's yummy dinners and visits from family, including time with her grandparents hearing their stories about "back in the day."

In school, Heidi played softball and soccer, earning the nickname of the Berlin Wall when on the field. She struggled a bit with her grades and her self-esteem. When she became pregnant her senior year, she decided to do it all on her own, despite her loving and supportive family that wanted to help. She moved into her own apartment with her boyfriend and took a full-time job at Golub while still finishing school. She delivered her son, Niklaus, just one month after graduation. The proudest moment of her life quickly turned dark as her relationship with her boyfriend turned to one of abuse. After three months of brutal beatings, she finally was able to go back home to her family and started a new life with a foundation of strength and determination. First, she fought for sole custody of her son. She knew she needed to protect him, and it didn't matter how much it cost or how much time it took, she wouldn't stop fighting. Finally, she won her case and all visitations had been terminated. Secure that her son was now safe, Heidi could focus on working and moving their lives forward.

Two years later, she met a man who helped her with the resulting self-esteem issues and welcomed her and Nik with open arms. They married, and baby Gabriella joined their family. Laughter came back into Heidi's life, and she made it to college to study criminal justice in hopes of becoming a state trooper. But she soon realized that wasn't the right job for her, so she took other jobs as a floral designer and working in a doctor's office before discovering what she was meant to do all along—real estate.



After 15 years together, Heidi realized her marriage was over and they went their separate ways. She found herself in another insecure time of her life, but her friends saw an opportunity. "I had a ball of fire in my belly, always wanting to be further ahead than I was," she says. "But I never knew how to get there. I had a couple of different friends suggest becoming a realtor. Eventually, I decided to give it a go." It was a daunting task-not only with the cost and class schedule on top of a full-time job and two kids—it also meant going back to a school environment, including the need to pass two mega tests. School had always been difficult for her, but Heidi was determined. She buckled down and didn't give up, finally earning her real estate license in 2009, then receiving her broker license in 2018. She began by working for a company that focused on flipping houses. She enjoyed the work, and quickly mastered

the process, soon becoming their acquisitions manager, averaging 70 deals a year and training the new agents, all while continuing to develop her own craft and her goals for herself. "I learned a lot about myself and work ethic over those six years," she says. "I learned that I wanted my own voice. I wanted more in my real estate career. I wanted my own brand. I wanted my neighbors to know I sold real estate. I was hidden for so many years behind the brand I worked for."

Her boss at the time told her she would never make it, but Heidi's internal fire came back full force, ready to prove everyone wrong. Despite not having a single client on her list to start, she opened Brass Tacs Real Estate Company, growing from zero clients to selling nearly \$15 million only four years later.

The Brass Tacs name holds a special meaning for her. "It's a strong name," she

explains. "It's not about my personal name. It's about a group who has strong values and tactical negotiation skills with a side of sweetness.
